# Major Infrastructure Improvements Coming to the Village in 2023

After years of planning and funding-approval stages by the federal and state agencies, the new year will bring several major projects starting construction in 2023 in Crestwood.

"We are very excited to finally get some very important infrastructure projects being built here in our Village," said Mayor Klein. "All of these projects have been years in the making and are funded by grants that have saved millions for Crestwood taxpayers. Because they are funded through federal and state and local agencies, they take a considerable time to get permits, approvals and funding in place. But in 2023, our residents will benefit greatly, and stated Mayor Klein recently. "Our administration and the Board of Trustees are committed to keeping Cicero Avenue strong, since it is the heart of our business community, and is a big reason our Village residential taxes are so low."

Construction is scheduled to begin in the 2nd half of 2023. It will cover the highway from the Cal Sag Channel south to 143rd Street.

#### Midlothian Turnpike Sidewalks

A key initiative of Crestwood through two administrations is to provide safe, accessible sidewalks all along the Turnpike, on both sides this major road, from Pulaski Road on the east to Central Avenue on the west. Funded by both the federal Surface Transportation Program and the Cook County Department of Transportation in grants, the Village will oversee 2 miles of concrete sidewalks constructed along the right-of-way.

#### Playfield Area Infrastructure & Rehabilitation Project

Starting again in spring 2023 will be the completion of Area 2-South of this multi-year, \$30-million-plus project to rebuild the water and sewer systems, along with the streets in the oldest neighborhoods in Crestwood. The North Section of Area 2 (north of 135th Street) was completed in 2022, with new water mains, cleaned and rehabbed storm sewers, newly lined sanitary sewers and resurfaced roads.

Attention once again returns to the South section, south of 135th Street, in the Crestwood Gardens neighborhood. This major project included newly lined sanitary sewers, which extend lifespan approximately 50 years and new water mains along the road rights-of-way, replacing the rear yard, old and leaking cast iron water pipes. A major part of this project included moving the residential water service lines from the rear yards to the front, new mains — allowing Village crews the ability to better service the water system in emergencies.

our community will be strengthened by these investments."

#### Cicero Avenue Streetlighting and Streetscape Project

The Village received more than \$5 million in federal dollars to upgrade the lighting on Cicero Avenue and the sidewalks all along this vital business corridor. The upgrades will include enhanced roadway lighting, pedestrian lighting for safety, improvements at the intersections of Cal-Sag Road, 135th Street and Midlothian Turnpike, and sidewalk improvements.

"The Village has been working on this project to secure grant funding over the last decade," "It has long been a vision of our Village to see our residents be able to walk along this key east/west roadway without walking in the road or along the side of the road in rain-soaked soil or snow," Mayor Klein said. "This federal & County-funded project is a big victory, at no cost to our taxpayers."

Construction is slated for April 2023.

Spring 2023 will bring a full replacement of all storm sewer pipes in the area. This will allow storm water runoff — particularly in major rains — to collect in the pipes more efficiently,

Construction will continue in 2023 for this \$9.5 million project funded by the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD). When completed in 2023, the project will carry additional stormwater in a large 6-foot trunk sewer from the Cook County Forest Preserve property at 135th Street and Central Avenue, along 135th Street, in front of the Nathan Hale schools, to the Laramie ditch north to the Cal-Sag Chan-

# **Preserving Our Heritage: J.J. Finn**

As part of the Tinley Park American Legion Post 615 Preserving Our Heritage initiative, we look this month at the stories and revelations of the valor and sacrifice of J.J. Finn.

On Dec. 7th, 1941, the Imperial Japanese Air Force attacked and bombed Pearl Harbor. Japan's primary goal was to destroy the U.S. fleet docked in Hawaii. This single act caused American opinion to turn away from an "America first" mentality, and the next day, President Franklin D. Roosevelt asked Congress for a declaration of war. Within days, Germany and Italy declared war on the United States of America. WWII had realistically and instantly become a "World War."

By February 1943, after months of intense fighting and heavy casualties, Soviet forces defeated Germany at Stalingrad and started its march to Berlin. In North Africa, British and American forces had defeated the Italians and Germans, and an Allied invasion of Italy followed, and Mussolini's government fell.

In May 1943, American and Canadian troops invaded Atuu Island in Alaska's Aleutian Islands, then occupied by the Japanese, and the island once again was under American control.

The U.S. naval victory at Coral Sea and Midway by early 1943 had slowed Japanese expansion in the Pacific, leading the way for U.S. sea and air forces to begin rolling back Japan's conquests.

J.J. Finn enlisted in the Navy on May 8, 1943. His patriotism was bubbling over, and he felt his service was most needed fighting for his country and the free world. Finn chose to join the Air Corps and fly in airplanes — and that he did. He was accepted into radioman school. There, he was trained as a specialist in communication and was taught expert skills and knowledge in the Navy's transfer of critical intelligence from ship and shore to aircraft.

Upon completion, he was assigned to the U.S.S. Franklin, an Essex-class aircraft carrier. As a rookie radioman aboard the Franklin, much of Finn's daily routine consisted of fixing radios on the fighter planes. But by June 1944, the war in the Pacific would come raging at him as he would soon acquire his baptism by fire. Finn was now a combat naval aviator sailing into the war on the Pacific as part of a crew flying a TBM-Avenger torpedo bomber, manufactured by General Motors. (During the war, GM, Ford and Chrysler didn't build cars — they built planes, tanks and jeeps.) Over the following year, he would experience some of the most horrific battles of the war.

J.J. Finn's and the U.S.S. Franklin's arrival in the region of the Pacific war began by taking part in the Mariana Island campaign, where their aircraft provided aerial strikes for landing forces at Bonin Island, Guam, Palau Islands, the Peleliu landing in September 1944, and more.

The *Franklin* continued in her supporting role during the landing at Leyte, during the Battle of Leyte Gulf. On Oct. 30th, 1944, she was at-

tacked by Japanese Kamikazes, which hit the front deck and crashed through the galley. Due to crippling damage, she departed for repair, refueling and resupplying at Puget Sound Navy Yard, Bremerton, Wash.

On March 3rd, 1945, Finn and the U.S.S. Franklin departed Pearl Harbor, ready for battle. Returning for combat in the Pacific, Finn

now joined Task Force 58 for air attacks on the Japanese homeland to support the Okinawa landings. Task Force 58, also known as the Fast Carrier Task Force, was an armada comprising, at times, more than 10,000 combat aircraft fighters. Dive- and torpedo bombers — including Finn's TBM-Avenger crew — could be launched in under an hour.

On March 19th, 1945, a Japanese aircraft attacked the U.S.S. Franklin with one of her 250-kg bombs smashing into the flight deck. The bomb caused massive fires, damage, explosions and deadly destruction. Making matters worse were the 53 aircraft aboard loaded with high-octane fuel. It was estimated that in the five hours following the attack, as many as 50 500-lb. bombs exploded on the flight deck. The explosions were so violent that nearby ships were rocked and lifted from the water.

It is well documented that Seaman 1st Class Ralph Packard aboard the U.S.S. Hunt recalled seeing things that were "ungodly."

"I saw guys flying through the air and past the U.S.S. Hunt," Packard remembers seeing through his 40-power long-range glasses. "And we were over a thousand yards away. ... I saw men running around on fire — just flaming torches."

Fact has it that the *Franklin*'s crew were called to their battle stations 12 times that night, and during a lull in the action retired to bed for rest. What the crew didn't know was that a lone Japanese bomber had made its way to the sleeping carrier, dropping two armor-piercing bombs, both of which tore through ship's deck. Nearby ships rushed to the Franklin's aid, placing their own hulls against her, allowing muchneeded help.

Hundreds remained on board working to save the vessel. Of the crewmembers aboard, 724 died and 265 were wounded. The Franklin managed to limp back to Pearl Harbor before finally arriving at the Brooklyn Navy Yard on April 28th, 1945. She was repaired and returned to service and never saw any more significant battle again, but it is a night Finn and the rest of the *Franklin*'s crew would never forget.

Over the course of World War II, the U.S.S. Franklin and her crew of approximately 3,500 lost more than 900 men and suffered severe

damage as the carrier that sustained the heaviest damage while surviving and continuing to fight in the war — thus the nickname, "The Ship That Wouldn't Die." She was honored with four Battle Stars. Franklin's was the 3rd-largest naval disaster of WWII. The U.S.S. Arizona lost 1,177 in December 1944 at Pearl Harbor, and 880 were lost from the U.S.S. Indianapolis in June 1945 near the Philippines.

V-E Day on May 8th, 1945, celebrated the unconditional surrender of Germany, ending WWII in Europe. V-J Day on Aug. 15th, 1945, marked the unconditional surrender of Japan and the end of WWII, one of the most deadly and destructive wars in history.

Throughout the war, J.J. Finn and his TBM-Avenger crew played a key role against Japanese surface forces, sinking many Japanese warships in the Pacific. Finn was discharged March 17th, 1946, and was awarded the American Campaign Medal, the WWII Victory Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal with four Battle Stars, each issued for meritorious participation in battle, Philippine Presidential Unit Citation, Philippine Liberation Medal, Air Medal for heroism while participating in aerial flight, Combat Action Ribbon for high-precedence participation in ground-and-surface combat, European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal, and the China-Burma-Indonesia Campaign Medal.

J.J.'s daughter Terry Finn provided all the pertinent information and facts that helped to develop this feature. With love and affection, she contributed mightily to bring to life her father's valorous and true experiences of WWII. Terry is a beacon and a revered friend to the (DAV) Chapter 84 Crestwood, Ill. (DAV) assists local veterans in filing benefit claims with the Veterans Administration. She is a well-respected, caring clinical psychologist who has helped many veterans.


# Someone You Should Know: Pearlie Buchanan

She's been one of your neighbors for some time — in fact, if you're reading this, she's probably lived in Crestwood for more years than you have. Pearlie Buchanan, who recently turned 93 years old, has been a Village resident for 70 years, and has resided at the same address all of that time.

Pearlie lived here with her late husband, Aire Lee Buchanan, raising six children here. Two of her children are deaf and had to be enrolled at the Jacksonville School for the Deaf. At the same time, Pearlie attended higher education outside the community, and later would take in her blind niece after her parents died, and care for her for the next 30 years.

A hard worker, Pearlie has been nothing if not self-driven, resourceful and determined, continuing to work after her husband's death through to the age of 70. Possessing a modest education, she maintains that times often were hard for her and her family, and that it took a lot of prayer and trust in God to see her through, and that it still does today.

Pearlie says that what she likes about living in Crestwood is the peace and quiet, and spacious living. She remembers the days when there was much more abundant vacant land, and how she and her father were permitted to plant gardens, and how they would invite friends and neighbors to come pick fresh produce. Though the surrounding areas have changed over the years, and the vacant land has receded considerably, Pearlie is still happy to be a lifelong resident of the Village of Crestwood.



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# Smoke Alarm Law Update Goes Into Effect Jan. 1st

In 2017, the Illinois Fire Safety Alliance worked with the General Assembly to pass a new law that will require Illinois residents to replace their old smoke alarms with the type that has a long-term, 10-year sealed battery beginning Jan. 1st, 2023. This applies to residents who still use alarms with removable batteries or alarms that are not hardwired.

#### What is the Updated Illinois **Smoke Alarm Law?**

- Since 1988, all dwellings in Illinois have been required to have smoke alarms.
- In 2017, Public Act 100-0200 was passed to update the Illinois Smoke Detector Act to reflect advances in alarm technology.
- Come Jan. 1st, 2023, any new smoke alarm being installed within a single- or multi-family home is required to be equipped with a 10-year sealed battery.

• Smoke alarms in single- or multi-family homes prior to Jan. 1st, 2023, may remain in place until they exceed 10 years from their manufactured date, fail to respond to operability tests, or otherwise malfunction.

### **Exemptions**

- Homes built after 1988 that already have hardwired smoke alarms.



# New Laws on the Books for Illinois in 2023

As of Jan. 1, 2023, hundreds of new laws take effect here in Illinois. Let's take a look at 15 significant new laws that are now officially on the books:

**HB 00209** Bans latex gloves for the use of handling and preparing food. (In favor of nonlatex gloves. Health care facilities will be required to ban their use after Jan. 1st, 2024.)

**HB 0347** Makes changes to the Sexual Assault Survivors Emergency Treatment Act to replace "pediatric" patients with "under the age of 18." Requires the Department of Public Health (DPH) to establish a timeframe within

which a hospital must submit a plan to provide certain services to sexual assault survivors, such as medical forensic services. Allows DPH to fine offending hospitals \$500 per patient if not in compliance.

**HB 00601** Expands the definition of the crime of possessing burglary tools to include devices to unlock or start a vehicle without a key and duplicating a signal from a key fob of a vehicle.

**HB 02739** Requires insurance companies to notify the Department of Insurance at least 30 days before beginning to write flood insurance policies.

**HB 03772** Provides people whose cars were stolen are not to be liable for violations, fees, fines or penalties when caught on red light cameras or speed cameras.

**HB 04304** Requires the Department of Children and Family Services to conduct exit interviews with every child, age 5 and over, who leaves a foster home within five days of the removal.

**HB 04338** Expands insurance coverage for prescription drugs to include prenatal vitamins after Jan. 1st, 2024.

**HB 04392** Allows a person to apply for felony expungement or sealing despite a

positive cannabis test within 30 days of filing of the petition.

**HB 04434** Allows the Secretary of State to issue special license plates for professional sports teams, including the Chicago Sky, the Chicago Red Stars and the Chicago Fire.

**HB 04821** Declares the Eastern Milksnake the official state snake of the State of Illinois.


**HB 05400** Prohibits a person from engaging in a street sideshow on any street or highway causing traffic to slow or stop to facilitate street racing or street sideshow. The Secretary of State must automatically process salvage or junking certificates to a salvage dealer who posts an annual bond of \$100,000.

Requires that before a licensed SB 02535 pharmacist dispenses an opioid, he or she must inform the patient that opioids are addictive and offer to dispense an opioid antagonist.

**SB 03019** Bans a child sex offender from working at a carnival, amusement enterprise, or fair.

**SB 03127** Formally recognizes emergency medical dispatchers as first responders.

**SB 03616** Changes the Illinois Human Rights Act to include traits historically associated with race, including hair texture and protective hairstyles such as braids, locks, and twists, to combat hair discrimination in the workplace.
