Midlothian Turnpike Sidewalk Project Completed

After 6 years of planning, searching for federal and County grant funding, engineering design and regulatory agency approval, Crestwood's objective to have pedestrian sidewalks along Midlothian Turnpike has been achieved. This winter, construction was essentially completed on four lineal miles of concrete sidewalks, from Central Avenue east to Pulaski Road.

"We are excited to finally see this important project complete," said Mayor Klein recently. "One of our goals for the Board of Trustees was to improve all the sidewalks along our major roadways in Crestwood, so this is a major milestone. Next year the sidewalks along Cicero Avenue will be improved, along with streetscaping and new pedestrian streetlights. We are in engineering design for new sidewalks and a bicycle path along 135th Street. And we received grant funding from the State for a path along Cal-Sag Road."

"Our residents need to be able to walk safely on walkways along these major streets—not in the street".



The Midlothian Turn sidewalks were paid for 80% with grants from the federal government, IDOT and Cook County Department of Transportation.

Mayor Klein added, "we are grateful that this nearly \$6 million project was funded largely by grants and not with taxpayer funds. Thanks to Mayor Lou Presta, who worked hard to get these grants, and to our friends at Cook County DOT who were so supportive."

2023 Surplus Applications AVAILABLE NOW and through the deadline of January 19, 2024

NOTE: If you have lived in your home since January 1, 2022 and are currently residing in the home and are an owner of the home (not a renter) you qualify for this program.

Well the tax bills are in the mail, and our Surplus Applications are available now and they will continue to be available through the deadline of January 19, 2024.

The program will be basically the same as in previous years, with everyone needing to pick up an original form at the Village. We do not accept copies or anything printed from the website.

The necessary items to file are as follows:

- 1. A copy of your 2nd installment 2022 Real Estate Tax Bill
- 2. Proof of payment of your tax bill from either Chase Bank or the Cook County Treasurer website (not your mortgage company)
- 3. A copy of the driver's license of the owners of the home with the Crestwood address. If the license has an out of state address you do not qualify.
- 4. A copy of your current paid water bill (excluding condo owners)


Shepard cheerleaders win LWE Invitational

Registration now open for spring semester classes at Moraine Valley

Moraine Valley Community College is offering an assortment of courses and formats for the spring 2024 semester. Aside from in-person classes, other formats include online and hybrid, which is a combination of online and face-to-face instruction. Classes start Jan. 16 and later.

Moraine Valley offers more than 130 degree and certificate programs. Students interested in transferring to four-year colleges or universities can earn associate degrees in Arts, Fine Arts, General Studies, Engineering Science, Applied Science or Science. Students also can choose from several career certificate programs, including Allied Health and Nursing, Business and Computer Sciences, Industrial Technology and Public Service. The college offers noncredit programs and courses as well.

Moraine Valley also offers several classes at its two extension sites – the Education Center at Blue Island (12940 S. Western Ave.), where students can complete the

Nursing Program in the health care classrooms and labs on-site, and the Southwest Education Center in Tinley Park (17900 S. 94th Ave.), which features the college's legal library for the Paralegal Program.

Tuition at Moraine Valley costs \$471 per three-credit-hour course compared to more than \$1,475 per class for private colleges or universities, ultimately saving students thousands of dollars each year.

Tuition is \$137 per credit hour plus fees and books. Mayor Ken Klein and the Board of Trustees have heard the requests of many to report crimes in our Village. Working with our Police Department, a compiled snapshot of a month's reporting will be shown here in the Adviser. Our intent is to inform the public in order to protect and be vigilant in calling upon our Police. The Mayor urges all to stay tuned in to your neighbors' well-being and property. Deceptive Practice/ SCAMS

11-07-2023: A resident reported that he was contacted by First Merchants Bank inquiring if he was in the process of making a cash withdrawal. After advising the bank representative that he hadn't attempted to make any withdrawals he learned that five withdrawals had been made from his accounts at several locations in Indiana totaling \$27,000.00.

11-09-2023: A business resident reported that they mailed a check in the amount of \$396.00 to a business in Crestwood, however, it appears that the check was intercepted, washed and then fraudulently cashed the same day. The amount of the check was checked from \$396.00 to \$996.00. It is believed that this check was stolen from a mailbox.

11-20-2023: A resident reported that she received a conformation letter from Merrill Lynch confirming her newly opened account. The victim advised she did not open an account nor did she give anyone permission to use her information.

11-20-2023: A resident reported that she received an email from what she perceived to be from Norton /Lifelock, a service that monitors identity and a service which the victim subscribes to. The email advised that the victims bank account would be debited \$304.00 and for her to contact the number in the email for further details. The victim contacted the number and was eventually transferred to a manager who was able to gain remote access to her personal computer and transferred \$30,000.00 from her savings account to her checking account. The \$30,000.00 was then transferred to a bank in Hong Kong. The victims personal computer was then locked out and only a blue screen appeared on the monitor. The victim was advised that there was a discrepancy with her bank account and would require \$13,000.00 to be transferred over to rectify the issue. Since the victim had no access to her computer, she was told to withdraw the money from her account and send it to an address in California. The victim

complied. Once the victim regained access to her computer she reviewed her bank accounts and realized she had been scammed.

Officers were provided a description of a suspect and as responding officers arrived in the area, a suspect matching the description was spotted. Officers attempted to talk with the suspect, who then fled on foot. After a brief foot chase, the suspect was taken into custody. 2 additional persons of interest were also identified and detained. During the investigation, a firearm was recovered on scene, which was discovered to be stolen out of Indiana. It was also discovered that a stray bullet from the incident has struck a kitchen window of a residence in the 131st block of East Playfield Drive. The incident is still under investigation, however, at this time the incident is not believed to be random. Upon talking to witnesses and viewing security video, it was learned that the offending silver S.U.V, fled the scene eastbound on Midlothian Turnpike. The Crestwood Police Department and the Southwest Major Crimes Task Force are investigating this incident.



Lithium-ion batteries supply power to many kinds of devices including smart phones, laptops, e-scooters and e-bikes, e-cigarettes, smoke alarms, toys, and even cars. If not used correctly, or if damaged, these batteries can catch on fire or explode.

The problem

- These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small amount of space.
- Sometimes batteries are not used the right way; batteries not designed for a specific use can be dangerous.
- Like any product, a small number of these batteries are defective. They can overheat, catch fire, or explode.

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions. Only use the battery that is designed for the device.
- Put batteries in the device the right way.
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed, or on a couch.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged. Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not
- charge them at temperatures below 32°F (0°C) or above
- Store batteries away from anything that can catch fire.

Signs of a Problem

Stop using the battery if you notice these problems: odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, or odd noises. If it is safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can

Battery Disposal

- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash.
- Recycling is always the best option. Take them to a battery recycling location or contact your community
- for disposal instructions. Do not put discarded batteries

Charging an E-bike
Charge your battery in a flat, dry area away from children, direct sunlight, liquids, tripping hazards, and in a location where the e-bike is not at risk of falling.







Let's Work Together & Make Snow Fall a

Non-Issue

We know snow is going to come sooner than later, so make sure your vehicles are not parked on the street after a one inch snow fall. Please do not blow or plow snow on our streets or neighbors yards.

The Police Department would like to emphasis the fact that you need to contain snow on your own property and not relocate it on village streets. This applies to all residential, commercial and industrial buildings. As a matter of fact,

Crestwood village code not only prohibits this, but can assess a fine if you are cited for this violation. Judging by the telephone calls that we receive each year pushing and blowing snow on a recently cleaned street erases the work done by our public works department and is inconsiderate to your neighbors. Crestwood has over 26 miles of streets to plow and the workers cannot keep coming back because of some careless individuals. Consider this a second warning to those that don't comply and receive a ticket from our police department. Winter weather can be



most difficult and we don't need to compound the problem.

The Village would also like to inform you of the protocol that the Village takes in a snow event. Our Village Services Director sends out our Public Work plows in two groups but there are different conditions that call for diverse plans of attack. He is in constant contact with the police department through a storm alert on street safety. He also keeps the Mayor informed of the plans to best handle the storm

and clean up after the storm has ended. A plow only or plow plus salt event is predicated by accumulation, driver safety and information from the weather service board. Salting in heavy accumulation or extreme cold temperatures with icing DOES NOT benefit our roadways. It most effective at temperatures above 20 F. In fact, salt is wasted on these types of events and has the potential to cause green kill. Trees up to 150 feet from a highway can be damaged--sometimes a salty mist from tires can harm trees a mile away. Salt splashes beyond streets, killing grass and gardens. Also, bare ground erodes quickly and erodes much needed nutrients from soil. Job performance is no longer measured by how much salt is applied per shift. Snow melts faster when salt is applied in narrow strips or as brine. Prudence in salt usage will be part of future salt planning; the EPA and IEPA are looking into the damage caused by over salting our roadways which include ground and surface water.

Our equipment is sent out during an event and primary areas are the main thoroughfares and intersections. Side streets are the last to be completed. The plow trucks concentrate on heavier traffic flow streets because of the potential of more accidents. We clear pathways on the less traffic streets until we can do a full clean up. The main street such as 135th, Midlothian Turnpike, Central Ave, Cicero Ave and Pulaski Ave are the domain of the State and County, though we assist when needed.

Let's work together to make a tough situation go away faster. Again, we ask for your patience in attending to the village streets. Safety is our main concern throughout the village during inclement weather. The Village as a whole would like to thank you for all your help to make this a safe winter in Crestwood.









New Year's Day Cast-Iron Skillet Rib Eye Roast, Roasted Veggies & Smashed Potatoes

Everyone celebrates the New Year differently—some staying up until midnight to watch the Times Square ball drop and others sing karaoke at a New Year's Eve party. But no matter what your New Year's tradition might be, it's always a good idea to fuel up with food. Here is a dinner idea that feel just as special as the occasion itself!

Ingredients

ROAST: One 3-pound boneless rib eye roast, Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper, 2 tablespoons olive oil, $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups beef stock, 2 cloves garlic, 2 sprigs fresh rosemary, 3 sprigs fresh thyme, 1 shallot, finely chopped, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup red wine, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup brandy, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup heavy whipping cream, 2 tablespoons wholegrain mustard & 3 tablespoons chopped fresh flat leaf parsley

SMASHED POTATOES: 3 pounds mini Yukon Gold potatoes, about golf ballsize, ¼ cup butter 1/4 cup olive oil, add more as needed, table spoon onion powder, table spoon garlic powder kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper, fresh rosemary, sea salt & 8oz of cheddar cheese

ROASTED VEGGIES: 10 strips thick-cut bacon, 6 tablespoons butter, 6 tablespoons Olive oil, 1 pound Brussels sprouts, halved, 1/2 pound of chopped carrots, 1/2 large onion, chopped, 2 tablespoons Minced garlic, Salt and freshly ground black pepper, 1 cup of shaved Parmesan cheese and Balsamic Vinegar

Directions for Roast

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F.
- 2. Place the roast on a paper towel-lined plate. Allow the roast to come up to room temperature, about 1 hour.
- 3. Pat the roast dry on all sides with paper towels. Sprinkle generously with salt and pepper.
- 4. Place a cast-iron skillet over high heat. Add the oil and heat until shimmering. Carefully lay the roast in the hot oil, being mindful that the oil may pop. Sear the roast until evenly browned and deeply seared on all sides, about 3 minutes per side. Turn off the heat and pour 1 cup beef stock into the skillet. Add the garlic cloves and surround the roast with the rosemary and thyme.
- 5. Transfer the skillet to the oven and roast, 45 to 60 minutes, depending on the desired doneness (for medium and a bright pink center, cook until an instant-read thermometer inserted in the center of the roast registers 130 degrees F, about 50 minutes). Transfer the roast to a cutting board. Discard the garlic cloves and herbs. Tent the roast with aluminum foil while creating the pan sauce.

- 6. Place the skillet back on the stove over medium-high heat. Add the shallots, red wine and remaining 1/2 cup beef stock and simmer, stirring occasionally, until the shallots have softened and the liquid has reduced in volume by half, about 5 minutes. Stir in the brandy, heavy cream and mustard and cook just until a thin sauce comes together, about 2 minutes more.
- 7. Slice the rested roast thinly and place on a serving platter. Serve warm with a drizzle of the sauce and a sprinkle of fresh parsley.

Directions for Mini Yukon Gold Smashed Potatoes

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F.
- 2. Add the potatoes and 1/4 cup salt to a large stockpot fitted with a strainer filled with water. Bring to a boil, then reduce to a simmer. Cook the potatoes until fork-tender, about 20 minutes. Using the strainer, remove the potatoes from the water and set aside to drain.
- Add 1/4 cup Olive oil to a baking sheet and coat generously. Gently dump or transfer the potatoes to the baking sheet using tongs. Smash the potatoes with the bottom of a cup until the tops crack open. Drizzle with butter and season with rosemary, salt, pepper, garlic and onion powder.
- 4. Bake until golden brown, about 30 minutes. Transfer the potatoes to a platter. Top with Cheddar Cheese as desired.

Directions for Roasted Veggies

- 1. Cook bacon in a large skillet over medium-high heat until crispy.
- 2. Remove to a paper towel-lined plate, then roughly chop
- 3. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F.
- 4. In same pan with bacon fat, add ¼ cup Olive oil and melt butter over medium heat
- 5. Add onions, minced garlic Brussels sprouts and Carrots. Cook, stirring occasionally, until sprouts are golden brown, 6 minutes.
- 6. Season with salt and pepper, to taste, and toss bacon back into pan.
- 7. Place in oven at 400 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes.
- B. When you are ready to serve add shaved Parmesan cheese and Balsamic Vinegar.
