

FEATURED ARTIST JUNEMARY ANN GRAJEK



Mary Ann Grajek, a current resident of Frankfort, said she has always enjoyed art and engaging in art-related projects throughout her lifetime. Growing up, she didn't think she could afford to go to college or art school. She didn't know anyone who made a living in the field of art and didn't want to end up as a "starving" artist. Instead, she decided to enroll in beauty school and received a cosmetology certificate before graduating from high school.

Grajek was a cosmetologist for over 35 years, owning several beauty shops and boutiques in Palos Heights and Worth as well as a barber shop in Chicago with her husband. She always enjoyed decorating her shop windows with clothes, wigs, and other boutique items for each season. Grajek was a forward-thinking entrepreneur—she was the first in the region to start hairdresser renting stations in buildings where cosmetologists became independent contractors, now commonplace in the industry. She was also first in the area to sell beauty wigs for cancer patients.

Nevertheless, Grajek has remained involved with various art-related ventures through the years—from the time she was in high school to when she was managing her businesses and raising her two children, and into retirement. She describes her lifetime calling as helping people, particularly by serving in a teaching role. She found herself teaching her employees how to do hair and teaching her children and grandchildren how to sew and create art. More recently, she has taught and led groups of children and adults in art-related projects, such as hosting a "painting experience" and gathering with church or neighborhood groups to make handmade items, often out of refurbished materials (i.e., mats, purses, pillow cases, dresses), to give to the homeless and those impacted by natural disasters. And

she has painted murals for family and friends, including a mural for her son's man cave.

After Grajek retired, she was encouraged by her daughter to take art classes. She enrolled in several college art classes at Moraine Valley Community College and later took art classes at Hobby Lobby, Vogt Center Visual Arts Center, and Tall Grass Gallery. Currently, she is taking art classes at the Biela Center in Crestwood with Carol Chirafisi, the Town and Country Art League President from 2017 to 2025. She recommends Carol's classes to anyone, especially those who are just beginning their art journey and want to gain a broad knowledge of art and learn basic drawing techniques. Grajek is grateful for all the art teachers who have encouraged her along the way.

Grajek stated that she joined several art organizations with the goal of self-improvement, including the Town and Country Art League (TCAL) more than ten years ago. Members meet every second Friday, September through May, at 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the Biela Center in Crestwood. TCAL members, like Grajek, are inspired by sharing their artwork as well as learning from different demonstrators who are local artists.

Grajek has displayed her artwork throughout the southwest suburbs, including in the Crestwood, Oak Forest (Acorn), and Worth libraries as well as the Pekoe and Bean Tea Room and Café in Tinley Park. She has held several one-woman shows at Salon Artists Gallery in Park Forest. Also, Grajek has participated in juried and open art shows at McCord Gallery in Palos Park, Moraine Valley Community College in Palos Hills, and Vogt Visual Arts Center in Tinley Park.

Ruse Burglaries Known to Rise in the Spring

Now that winter is almost over, many people are ready to start their Spring projects, which may include home repairs. The scammers know this information, which can cause an increase in the number of ruse burglaries and scams during the spring and summer. These crimes are often being committed by career criminals specializing in ruse entries and home repair fraud.

Ruse ploys often begin with the offenders creating an excuse to enter the victim's home. After selecting a home by profiling it, the offenders often claim to be a utility worker, village employee or a contractor. They will enter the home using the ruse of checking something (water pressure, fuses, pipes). While one offender keeps the homeowner occupied, one or more additional offenders enter the home undetected and commit a burglary.

Offenders in these types of crime can obtain thousands of dollars with a relatively low risk of apprehension. Offenders will target victims who are generally less likely to make a good witness due to such things as impaired vision or memory, commonly associated with advanced age. Crimes like this many times go unreported.

The typical ruse burglary takes place Monday through Friday during the day with most occurring between 7:00 a.m. and noon. Offenders will target their victims by driving through neighborhoods looking for seniors doing yard work or by following them from grocery stores or pharmacies.

The Crestwood Police Department urges residents to be observant of their surroundings and report suspicious persons or activities when they are occurring. Residents should observe their neighbors' homes for suspicious activities and be aware that these types of crimes occur on a regular basis in every town. By calling their neighbors when they become aware of suspicious activities, they may prevent their neighbor from becoming a victim. Writing down license

plates and vehicle descriptions may assist police at a later time if a crime is reported.

If you are approached by someone purporting to be a worker needing to enter your house, DO NOT LETTHEM IN without first contacting the utility, Village or the police. By requesting identification from the worker you may prevent yourself from becoming a victim by showing the offender that you are alert to the possibility that they are not who they claim to be.

Utility companies such as ComEd, Nicor, Comcast and AT&T provide employees with identification cards. Utility workers will also have utility service vehicles, so be wary of "workers" without an official vehicle. Utility workers from those companies

which provide services to your home will generally only be coming to your home at your request, so if someone shows up at your door, verify who they are.

Additionally, avoid home repair scams by never allowing someone to perform driveway sealing or other repairs on the spot. Residents are advised not to let transient workers perform repair work without providing a business card, allowing you to check on the reputation of the business.

If ever in doubt, or if the person is persistent in entering your home, close and lock your door and call 9-1-1 immediately. The Police Department would rather investigate an innocent misunderstanding than have a victim of this type of crime.



Virtual reality added to heating and air conditioning

classes at Moraine Valley

Learning comes in all different forms, and Moraine Valley Community College heating and air conditioning (HAC) faculty are making sure their students are

equipped with all the tools necessary to succeed. This past semester, they included virtual reality (VR) to the class repertoire.

John Moreno, Moraine Valley heating and air conditioning instructor, took on the task of learning about VR for one year and incorporating it into his classroom.

"This is simply a part of learning. I think it's very advantageous. It's like driver's ed or astronaut training. There's nothing like the real McCoy, but this is to get them all beefed up. Plus, the students can get hurt or electrocuted working on the real thing and this way they can't," Moreno said. "In my day, we had a book and saw a grainy movie. To me, this is a big positive and will be more helpful. I love it and use it all the time. We're always looking for new ways to teach."

The HAC Department has seven headsets with pistol grips that each class can use. Moreno said the Introduction to Controls and the Installation and Services classes have used them, but incorporating VR more thoroughly into classes is still in its infancy. In the simulation, students can walk through a house or on the roof of a commercial building and access HAC units or thermostats to practice on. The headset guides students with prompts through different scenarios created by the instructor.

"It's simple but good for muscle memory and helps you get familiar with the equipment. It'll tell you with prompts what tasks to do, and you'll see the checkmarks when it's completed. It has all the OSHA [Occupational Safety and Health Administration] guidelines, so you know you're doing everything right," said returning student David Dunski, of Oak Forest. "I've always done virtual reality for fun, and this is a more fun way to do class."

The spring semester was the first time Moreno incorporated VR into classes, but he hopes to expand it more this summer and introduce more robust usage in the fall.



What Has Happened

Last July, PJM, the transmission system operator for northern Illinois, held its annual capacity auction, through which it purchases electricity generation resources in advance of future demand. This cost makes up part of the Supply portion of a customer's monthly ComEd bill. For customers who receive energy supply from ComEd, this cost is passed through with no mark up by, or profit to, ComEd.

Because of power plant retirements, increased load and more frequent instances of extreme weather, capacity prices stemming from the PJM capacity auction have risen significantly and will result in a 10-15 percent increase in ComEd electric bills beginning in June and will be reflected in the July bill.

WHO IS PJM?

PJM Interconnection is a Regional Transmission Organization (RTO) that coordinates the movement of wholesale electricity in all or parts of 13 states, including the ComEd territory of northern Illinois, and the District of Columbia. It's a federally regulated independent organization that manages the bulk power transmission system and operates a competitive wholesale electricity market.

WHY ARE CAPACITY PRICES INCREASING?

There are several reasons for price increases

- There is a lack of reliable fossil fuel (gas and coal) plants. Some of those plants have become less reliable in the face of increasing severe weather and were not able to bid their capacity into the auction.
- 2. Some fossil fuel plants are retiring, which leads to less capacity.
- 3. The PJM interconnection permission process has slowed the availability of renewable energy to replace the capacity lost from fossil fuel plants.
- 4. There is a projected increase in load demand from data centers, Al and greater electrification



HOW IS COMED HELPING CUSTOMERS?

We know any increase is tough—so we're stepping up support. ComEd now has a portion of its website dedicated to educating customers and connecting them to resources. Customers can visit ComEd.com/BillSupport to find additional information about solutions to help them manage rising costs. The new website works in conjunction with ComEd's Smart Assistance Manager, an online resource available at ComEd.com/SAM that makes it easier to identify and take advantage of programs that will help customers with both their immediate and future bills.

These efforts support ComEd's long-running efforts to help educate customers on money-saving programs, including energy efficiency offerings, energy-savings tips, and bill-assistance options.

ComEd also filed in 2024 with the Illinois Commerce Commission a proposal for a Low-located Piccount (LID) program, which was approved in March 2025. LID belos incomes

LID helps income-eligible residential customers manage their energy bills by enabling them to qualify to receive a percentage-based discount on their monthly electric bill determined by income level. ComEd's LID program is expected to go into effect in 2026.






