A Village on the Move Disabled Illinois Veterans State-of-the-art facility coming to Crestwood

The board of Trustees in Crestwood, Illinois unanimously approved the donation of a parcel of land for the construction of a \$5 million veteran center in the village by the Disabled Illinois Veterans (DIV) at their monthly Trustee Meeting, Tuesday, February 13th. held at the Village Hall.

The estimated \$5 million project includes construction of a 30 thousand square foot building designed to be a state-of-the-art, energy efficient facility. The centers main floor and rooftop garden will be open to the public and will include a tearoom and coffee lounge as well as a bistro on its main floor. Informational displays and kiosks will provide visitors with information about Chicagoans who have served and currently serve in America's armed forces, as well as the value and necessity incumbent upon Americans to support the country's armed forces.

Most of the facility will be devoted to assisting veterans and the families of veterans to successfully reenter civilian society following their active duty and to assist them in accessing the full range of entitlements owed and benefits bestowed by grateful Americans, in recognition of their service and sacrifice to our nation.

The center will be staffed with professional counselors who will assist veterans in achieving a successful transition from military service with job placement assistance, educational tutoring for veterans seeking to continue schooling, trade apprenticeship support, and entrepreneurial education and support for veterans seeking to start or grow their own business. office to provide counseling to veterans who have run afoul of the law. According to a study conducted by the US

Department of Veteran Affairs, nearly half of all veterans arrested for crimes have been found to be suffering from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, clinical anxiety or depression disorders, or alcohol and/or narcotic addiction. Often, it has been found, veterans' addictions to alcohol and narcotics are brought about by self-medication for untreated and undiagnosed psychological conditions. Professional, and state certified counselors will be employed by the center to work with these individuals to assist them to overcome these maladies and return them to successful and productive paths within society.

Physical therapy will also be provided for injured and aging veterans at the facility, under the direction of certified therapists, taking place in the centers fully equipped physical therapy center, located in the lower level of the center.

An expansive meeting room on the facilities second floor, will be designed to offer meetings and events to all veteran groups within the area, as well as for planned informational gatherings where the public will be invited to view screenings of popular movies and documentaries about military events and join in discussion, following these screenings, with actual participants of the events they view.

Former Big League Manager & Pitching Coach Larry Rothschild Hired as Pitching Consultant

Veteran Major League pitching Coach Larry Rothschild has been added to the Windy City Thunder-Bolts' staff for the 2024 season as a pitching consultant. Rothschild brings 47 years of professional baseball experience as a player, coach or manager to Crestwood. He has spent 35 years on Major League coaching staffs, including four as a big league manager.

"I'm super excited to have Larry joining us," said ThunderBolts manager Bobby Jenks. "His experience and knowledge of the game is a real asset to the players. I'm personally looking forward to learning from him to become a better manager, coach and mentor to the players."

Rothschild may be best known in Chicago as the pitching coach for the Chicago Cubs from 2002-2010. He was on the staff for the 2003 team that came within one win of the World Series and for the division winning teams of 2007 and 2008. He has also served as pitching coach for the Cincinnati Reds, Florida Marlins, New York Yankees and San Diego Padres and has won two World Series rings – with the 1990 Reds and 1997 Marlins. During his tenure as Yankees pitching coach from 2011-2019, they led the American League in both wins and strikeouts.

In 1998, Rothschild was named the first manager of the Tampa Bay Devil Rays, a post he maintained for the first three years of the franchise's existence. The Devil Rays improved their winning percentage in each year that he was there.

Scott Proefrock, the president of New England Baseball, LLC, was instrumental in bringing Rothschild to the Windy City. As part of his role in New England, Proefrock also provides executive oversight to the ThunderBolts. "I have worked with and competed against Larry, and I know the impact he has had on the pitchers he's worked with throughout his time in the game," Proefrock said. "His experience, knowledge and wisdom will be tremendous re-



sources for our players and staff. He will make us all better."

In his new role, Rothschild will consult with Jenks and the Windy City pitching staff during spring training and during extended periods of the regular season. The Bolts ranked eighth in the Frontier League in 2023 with a 4.85 team ERA.

"I'm looking forward to working with Bobby Jenks and the Thunderbolts," Rothschild said. "Even in a limited role it will be fun to help pitchers improve. As an added bonus, I get to spend some time in my old neighborhood which provided many great memories."

Rothschild grew up on Chicago's South Side in the Beverly neighborhood, less than ten miles from Ozinga Field. After spending most of his high school years at Morgan Park Academy, he graduated from Homewood-Flossmoor High School. He played baseball collegiately at Florida State University.

When you change the clocks, check your smoke alarms. If they are 10 years old, replace them. Working smoke alarms save lives.

Daylight Savings: Spring Ahead & test your Smoke/ CO Detectors

We trade an hour of sleep for more daylight at the end of the day this time of year – a fair trade for most of us! It is also the twiceannual reminder to check one of the most important safety devices in your home: Smoke & Carbon Monoxide Detectors.

A working smoke detector and carbon monoxide detector can save your life in the event of a fire or related occurrence: smoke inhalation and a CO leak can also be deadly. Never tamper with a detector – no annoying chirp is worth risking your life by ignoring or removing the detector. Place them outside of each sleeping area, on each level of your home. Place at least 10 feet from the stove to avoid a false alarm.

According to the National Fire Prevention Association, modern devices vary – which can be confusing when you go to check the batteries or even expiration of your detectors. Here's some information from the NFPA on the various types of detectors:

- Smoke alarms with non-replaceable 10-year batteries are designed to remain effective for up to 10 years. If the alarm chirps, warning that the battery is low, replace the entire smoke alarm right away.
- Smoke alarms with any other type of battery need a new battery at least once a year. If that alarm chirps, warning the battery is low, replace the battery right away.
- When replacing a battery, follow manufacturer's list of batteries on the back of the alarm or manufacturer's instructions. Manufacturer's instructions are specific to the batteries (brand and model) that must be used. The smoke alarm may not work properly if a different kind of battery is used.
