


A Personal Commitment to Water Safety

When Dave Benjamin discusses water safety with students, he knows too well the risks of drowning. An avid surfer, Benjamin nearly lost his life in Lake Michigan a couple of years ago.

Knocked from his surfboard into the rough icy waters, Benjamin kept fighting waves that continually pushed him down. With his board snapped in half, he needed to remember the techniques that save someone from drowning.

Since the incident Benjamin has devoted himself to educating students about the risks of drowning. He and GLSRP co-founder Bob Pratt visit schools and summer camps throughout the region to teach.

Statistics support their mission: More American students drown annually than from school shootings, fires and earthquakes combined schools routinely prepare for such incidents, but generally do not teach water safety.



This week he brought the Great Lakes Surf Rescue Project to Richards, Shepard and Eisenhower high schools, and Delta and Summit learning centers.

For District 218 the presentation remains especially poignant. Richards counselor John Kocher's son, Matt, then a sophomore at Andrew High School, drowned in Lake Michigan.

While it's always a good time to learn how to recognize the dangerous currents, how to recognize someone at risk of drowning, and how to rescue and resuscitate them, it's especially opportune now: Summer approaches, and Lake Michigan remains the most dangerous of the Great Lakes.

In fact, nearly twice as many people drowned last year in Lake Michigan as any other.

Recycling Reminder

This is just a reminder to all residents and businesses to prevent contaminated recyclables from going into our recycling bins. This applies to everything, but food items in particular are a common problem. Used pizza takeout boxes, bottles, cans or jars that haven't been thoroughly rinsed, aluminum foil of any sort whether clean or not, as well as disposable foil pans of the sort used in baking or for catering, are all items that can contaminate the pool of recyclables and cause them — along with everything else in their vicinity — to be unfit for recycling, defeating the purpose of the program. When this happens, it forces recycling companies like Republic Services to find alternative solutions for the contaminated materials, and it substantially increases costs for local recycling programs.

Reminder: Yard Waste Pickup Resumes April 3rd

As we nervously put away our shovels and snow blowers for the season, we start thinking about getting our yards cleaned up and eventually planting our beautiful gardens. Starting April 3rd, you can once again start bringing your yard waste out to the curb. Please remember to have your yard waste properly bagged or in a designated can with a yard waste sticker on it. Crestwood Police Department Warns of Sextortion Scams

The Crestwood Police Department wants the community to be aware of a recent crime trend in the area.

"Sextortion" is the practice of extorting money or sexual favors from someone by threatening to reveal evidence of their sexual activity.

Victims have responded on social media to people with random numbers and unknown user profiles, who subsequently solicit the victim to send nude images of themselves. Once offenders obtain the images, the offender extorts the victim for money. The offender threatens the victim with distributing their images if payment is not received.

The Crestwood Police warns the community not to share private images of themselves with strangers, and to call the Police Department if they need further assistance.

We Watch, We Call!

Mayor Ken Klein and the Board of Trustees have heard the requests of many to report crimes in our Village. Working with our Police Department, a compiled snapshot of a month's reporting will be shown here in the Adviser. Our intent is to inform the public in order to protect and be vigilant in calling upon our Police. The Mayor urges all to stay tuned in to your neighbors' well-being and property. Call our police, report suspicious activity, be aware. (911 or Dispatch non-Emergency 708-385-5131).

Each month we continue to remind residents about all the scams that are occurring. Please remember that if anyone contacts you for any reason — overdue taxes, warrant for your arrest, allegations of illegal activity on your accounts — and offers to allow you to settle the matter by purchasing gift cards, IT IS A SCAM!

Do not give anyone on the phone your personal or banking information.

Do not allow anyone over the phone or via email or link to access your computer.

If you have any doubts at all, please contact the police department for advice. Senior Service Office Tom Dawson or any other police officer will be able to assist you in determining if it is a scam. Our officers are here 24 hours a day and would rather respond to assist you in preventing a scam then to have to take a report where you have been scammed out of thousands of dollars. purchase approximately \$5,000.00 worth of gift cards from local retail establishments and to contact the caller with the information.

02-21-2023: A resident reported that after downloading TubiTV, an Amazon login appeared on her TV that she was unable to clear. She then called the number on the screen and spoke with an individual claiming to be an Amazon specialist. She was then instructed to access her personal laptop and the caller sent an external link that she accepted. The link allowed her personal laptop to be shared on the screen. She was then instructed to access her banking account due to unauthorized purchases to Amazon. The victim became suspicious and discovered two unauthorized transactions for \$100.00 each at which time she contacted her bank institution and had her accounts frozen.

02-22-2023: A resident reported that upon checking her banking accounts, she discovered several unauthorized transactions valued at over \$600.00.

Deceptive Practice

Upon calling the number, she spoke with a representative who convinced her to make two separate withdrawals from her bank account. She was instructed to go to the Shell Gas Station and deposit the \$6,500.00 into the BitCoin machine and create an account. After the deposit was made, she was to contact the caller and provide the deposit information. Upon speaking with family members, she learned that she was the victim of a scam.

02-11-2023: A resident reported that she received an email from Bank of America in reference to a new account being opened in her name. The victim advised that she had not opened any new accounts, and that this was unauthorized use of her information.

02-15-2023: A resident reported that she received a letter from Tomo Mortgage Company advising that someone had submitted a mortgage application using her identity.

02-20-2023: A resident reported that she responded to an email on her computer and called a number to what she thought was Microsoft. She was then convinced to go 02-27-2023: A resident reported that he had engaged in a relationship with a woman named "Natalie" whom he met online via Instagram. Within the last two weeks, he had sent gift cards to the woman via a messaging application called Signal. The victim was also persuaded to send fully nude images of himself to "Natalie" on this application. When the victim refused to send any additional money, "Natalie" started threatening to disperse his photos to friends, family and the public if he didn't pay her \$1,000.00 in gift cards.

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Preserving Our Heritage: Harold Robert McClory

As part of the Tinley Park American Legion Post 615 Preserving Our Heritage initiative. My journey, starting in 2010 and spanning more than 40 World War II-related features, will continue. This month, we look at the stories and revelations of the valor and sacrifice of Harold Robert McClory, the father of the author of this feature.

Harold was born Sept. 28th, 1921, to Clement and Rose McClory, at 3009 S. Homan Ave., in Chicago. He was the oldest son of eight children, and by 1935, the couple had moved to 1905 S. Crawford (now Pulaski) Ave. — the seventh move for the family in 13 years.

At the tender and impressionable age of 15, Harold, along with his family, would experience some unfortunate hardship. He and his seven brothers and sisters became orphaned in 1937. His youngest sister, Rosemary, was adopted by family. The other two sisters and four brothers were placed in St. Joseph's Home of the Friendless in Chicago. Oldest son Harold, now 16, was placed in a juvenile detention center until the age of 18, at which point he joined the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), a voluntary government work relief program that was a major part of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal started in 1933.

With the CCC, Harold traveled to Wisconsin where he would acquire the nickname "Mac" that would stick with him the rest of his life — but by the end of 1942, WWII had reduced the corps to 200,000 men in about 900 camps. With the war raging, Congress recommended the CCC be terminated on July 1st, 1942.

On Feb. 23rd, 1943, Mac was inducted into the U.S. Army, attending basic and advanced individual training at Camp Wallace in Texas. There, he was assigned to the 50th Field Artillery Battalion. He departed New York City and was shipped to North Africa in July that year. It was there that the 505th became part of Gen. Mark Clark's 5th Army.

After North Africa was secured, the 5th Army served as the main U.S. component of "Operation Avalanche," the amphibious assault at Salerno, Italy, in September 1943. France, aiding in the success of the D-Day invasion.

With the other Allied soldiers, Mac pushed through Northern Italy into France when German forces in Italy capitulated on May 2nd, 1945, two days after the collapse of Berlin.

There was no "soft underbelly," as Winston Churchill had suggested, but instead a "tough old gut," as Gen. Clark had referred to it. American casualties at Anzio alone totaled approximately 59,000. Combat was difficult in terrain crossed by rivers and mountains well-suited for defensive tactics, and Italy's bitter cold winters and hot and rainy summers made battle exhausting. The supply of food and ammunition was slow, and wounded men had to be carried several miles to receive medical aid.

An overwhelming number of German divisions were held down during the Italian campaign, leaving only 33 divisions in Northern France to repel the D-Day invasion. Harold The Allied forces in Italy fought gallantly, with more than 300,000 U.S. and British troops ending up killed, wounded or missing. German casualties totaled approximately 430,000.

The grim and horrific struggles of war had been a punch in the gut for Mac McClory. He and the 5th Army concluded their duty pushing through France to Berlin, and V-E Day, where he finished his service as a prisoner of war guard in Germany.

Mac returned stateside Nov. 25th, 1945, after two and a half years of combat and was honorably discharged Dec. 1st, 1945, at Camp Grant, Ill.

PFC Harold "Mac" McClory was awarded three Bronze Battle Stars for exemplary conduct during ground combat while participating in the Naples-Foggia, Rome and Arno campaigns. One Bronze Star, awarded for heroic achievement during ground combat action with the 505th Field Artillery Battalion, the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon, Good

would cash his check on Friday afternoon, arrive home and hand his paystub, along with the exact amount of cash, into Adeline's hands. Mac would get an allowance, which included bus fare, lunch money for work, and a few bucks for Friday beer money. He always saved his bus/lunch money for extra Friday-Saturday beers by walking two miles to and from work every day.

During the Christmas holiday season, Mac worked part-time at the post office downtown, about 26 hours a week. Adeline and Mac would also borrow money from Household Finance Corporation on Archer and Kedzie, providing a merry Christmas for their eight children.

Mac spent his spare time playing 16-inch softball with the American Legion, F.W. Woolworth and sometimes as a "ringer" at Kelly Park, McKinley Park, Gage Park, Chicago Ave., Grant Park and 47th and Damen Ave. He took great pride in winning the 1960 state championship with the Archbishop Weber Knights of Columbus.

In the spring of 1944, the 5th Army broke through the German defense and continued the March to Rome. Senior command had decided the 5th Army would trap the retreating German forces. However, Gen. Clark diverted to Rome, and on June 4th, 1944, Clark's army became the first Allied military force to liberate a fascist-controlled capital. It will never be known if Clark's refusal to obey orders allowed the Germans to escape and re-establish a line north of Rome.

On June 6, 1944 — "D-Day" — Allied troops invaded Normandy, France. For nearly two years, Mac, with the rest of the 5th Army, had fought a war of attrition during the Italian campaign against an unwavering and skillful German Army, becoming one of the war's most costly and wearing campaigns. The campaign tied down enemy forces, drawing reserves from Conduct Medal, Army of Occupation Medal – Germany, the WWII Victory Medal and four Overseas Service Bars.

Prior to overseas duty, Mac had married his sweetheart, Adeline Kmak. Arriving home at 3859 S. Spaulding Ave., he was greeted by his newborn daughter, Donna. Adeline and Mac moved into their new apartment at 3218 W. 38th St., raising their children Donna, Annette, Kenneth and Colleen. They then moved to 3730 S. Kedzie Ave., raising four more children including Timothy, Marlene, Angela and Mary-Del.

Mac landed a job at F.W. Woolworth Distribution Center and worked there for the next 30 years. To his credit, he never missed a day of work. Friday was always a lean day, as the family lived from paycheck to paycheck. Mac As a housewife responsible for raising eight children, Adeline had little time for mixing socially, but did enjoy her cherished time spent with her lifelong friends Do-Do and Viola. Both Adeline and Mac revolved their family life around Adeline's parents, Busia and Dziadzia Kmak and their strong Polish traditions.





Respect Week features a variety of activities designed to inspire people to treat everyone, especially those with special needs, with kindness and dignity.






