Another Successful Shredding Event

On June 4th, the Crestwood Police Department held its Document Shredding Fundraiser onsite at the Police Department. This annual event has been hosted by the police department for the last eight years, with donations raised from the event going toward the department’s fundraising efforts for Special Olympics Illinois.

According to event coordinator Detective Chris Soderlund, even after eight years, there is no indication that people are running out of shredding. “Even though the event doesn’t start until 9am, we have people lining up by 8:30,” Soderlund says. “We provide people with a safe and secure way to get rid of documents that contain their personal information, while raising a little money for the athletes of Special Olympics.”

The onsite shredding is provided by Beaver Shredding, which donates the service each year in support of the Crestwood Police Department’s fundraising efforts.

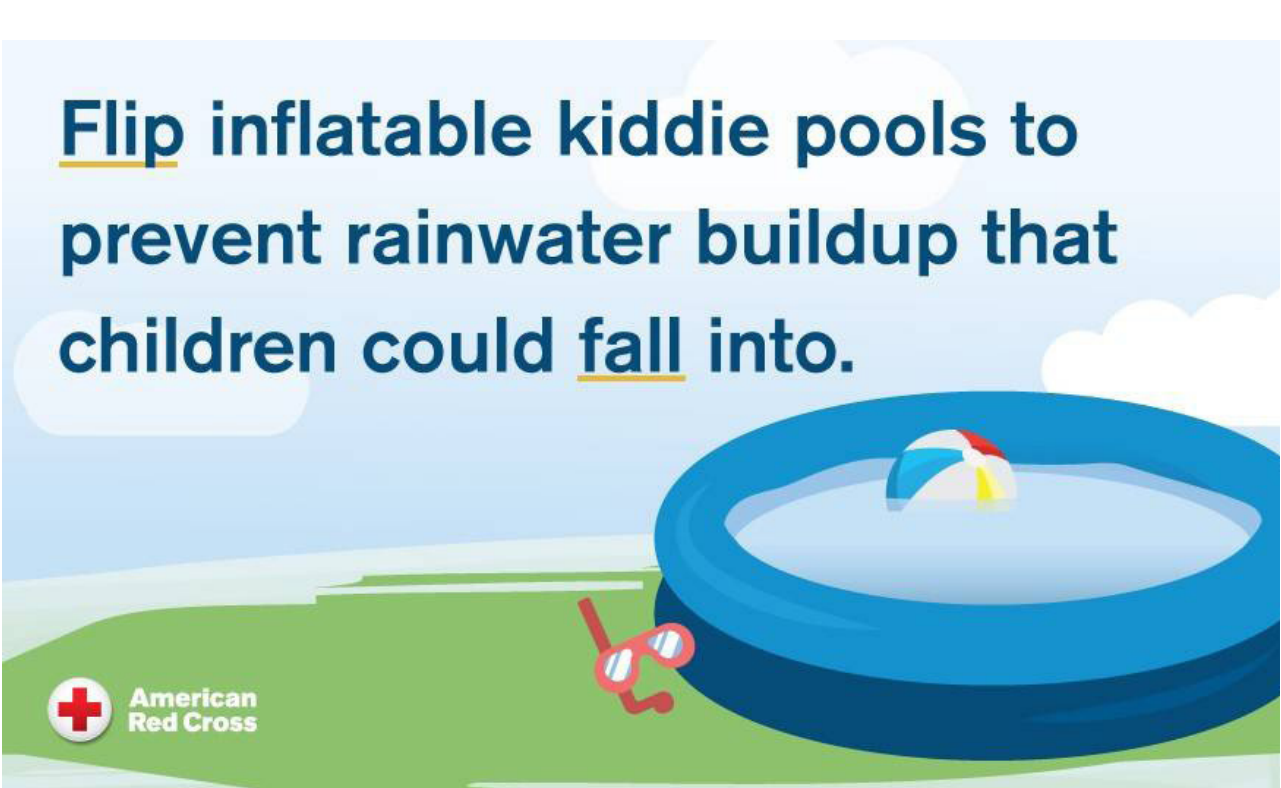
An Appeal to Common Sense for Fireworks Safety and Consideration

We would like to respectfully ask Village residents to exercise common sense judgment when it comes to backyard or driveway fireworks displays. Many of the fireworks that are sold legally in neighboring states are still illegal to sell, possess or use here in Illinois, and more than that, they are often dangerous, causing serious injury to many, with a high percentage of victims being children under 11.

Obviously, some will be tempted to scoff at the law. Apart from the illegality and the dangers posed by many fireworks made available each year, there are other factors to consider — not least, our vets and our pets. For those suffering from combat-related PTSD, fireworks can be a triggering event of great anxiety. For dogs and other domestic animals, the seemingly random explosive sounds of fireworks are frightful and panic-inducing. We ask that people think, and to act with consideration and thoughtfulness for those in your community.

In any event, due to the public safety risk and the risk to property loss, the Village of Crestwood ordinance explicitly prohibits any person from possessing, manufacturing, storing, selling or exploding fireworks in the Village all year round. The law in Illinois does not change over the July 4th holiday or any other holiday.

Let the professionals put on the show and just enjoy!

Recycling Reminder

This is just a reminder to all residents and businesses to prevent contaminated recyclables from going into our recycling bins. This applies to everything, but food items in particular are a common problem. Used pizza takeout boxes, bottles, cans or jars that haven’t been thoroughly rinsed, aluminum foil of any sort whether clean or not, as well as disposable foil pans of the sort used in baking or for catering, are all items that can contaminate the pool of recyclables and cause them — along with everything else in their vicinity — to be unfit for recycling, defeating the purpose of the program. When this happens, it forces recycling companies like Republic Services to find alternative solutions for the contaminated materials, and it substantially increases costs for local recycling programs.


Republic Services remains committed to providing us with reliable services. Extreme action is necessary to keep our local recycling programs operating as intended. We must work together as a Village to do better. As usual, the Village will take on any additional cost for service, but we are asking you to do your part as residents. With gas prices being what they are this summer, for many, travel options are limited. But there are options right here in Cook County that can help you to get away from it all. Gift Card Scams

Someone might ask you to pay for something by putting money on a gift card, like a Google Play or iTunes card, and then giving them the numbers on the back of the card. If they ask you to do this, they’re trying to scam you. No real business or government agency will ever insist you pay them with a gift card. Anyone who demands to be paid with a gift card is a scammer. Read on to learn more about gift card scams.

What Gift Card Scams Looks Like

Gift cards are for **gifts**, not for payments. But they’re popular with scammers because they’re easy for people to find and buy, and they have fewer protections for buyers compared to some other payment options. They’re more like cash: once you use the card, the money on it is gone. Scammers like this.

If someone calls you and demands that you pay them with gift cards, you can bet that a scammer is behind that call. Once they have the gift card number and the PIN, they have your money. Scammers may tell you many stories to get you to pay them with gift cards, but this is what usually happens:

1. The caller says it’s urgent. The scammer says you have to pay right away or something terrible will happen. But be assured, don’t, and it won’t.
2. The caller usually tells you which gift card to buy. They might say to put money on an eBay, Google Play, Target or iTunes gift card. They might send you to a specific store — often Walmart, Target, CVS or Walgreens. Sometimes they say to buy cards at several stores, so cashiers won’t get suspicious. And the caller might stay on the phone with you while you go to the store and load money onto the card. These are all signs of a scam.
3. The caller asks you for the gift card number and PIN. The card number and PIN on the back of the card let the scammer get the money you loaded onto the card. And the scammer gets it right away.

How Scammers Convince You to Pay With Gift Cards

Scammers pretend to be someone they’re not to convince you to pay with gift cards. They want to scare or pressure you into acting quickly, so you don’t have time to think or talk to someone you trust. Here’s a list of common gift card scams and schemes:

- The caller says they’re from the government — maybe the IRS or the Social Security Administration. They say you have to pay taxes or a fine, but it’s a scam.
- Someone says you’ve won a prize but first, you have to pay fees or other charges with a gift card. Remember: no honest business or agency will ever make you pay with a gift card. But also — did you even enter that sweepstakes?

What To Do If You Paid a Scammer With Gift Cards

If you paid a scammer with a gift card, **tell the company that issued the card right away**.

Amazon

- Call 1 (888) 280-4331.
- Keep the Amazon card itself and your receipt for the Amazon card.

Safely Buying and Using Gift Cards

Remember that gift cards are for **gifts**, not for payments. So if you buy gift cards to give away or donate:

- **Stick to stores you know and trust.** Avoid buying from online auction sites because the cards may be fake or stolen.
- **Check it out before you buy it.** Make sure the protective stickers are on the card and that they do not appear to have been tampered with. Also check that the PIN number on the back isn’t showing. Get a different card if you spot a problem.
- **Keep your receipt.** This, or the card’s ID number, will help you file a report if you lose the gift card.

Report Fraud

If someone asks you to pay them with gift cards:

- Report it to the Federal Trade Commission at ReportFraud.ftc.gov. Report it even if you didn’t pay. Your report helps law enforcement stop scams.
- You can also report it to your state attorney general.
- If you lost money, also report it to local law enforcement. A police report may help when you deal with the card issuer.

What to Know About Watering Your Lawn

There are many misconceptions with regard to how and when you should water your lawn. We invite you to take a look at five common myths about lawn watering to give you some helpful tips on what’s best. These are important, as proper watering is the one lawn care task that will impact your lawn more than any other.

Misconception #1: I Don’t Have to Water My Lawn

One of the most common misconceptions is the misbelief that there is no reason to water it on your own. A lot of people think that rain will naturally provide a lawn with what it needs. But what about a dry spell? While your lawn can survive a couple weeks of drought, it will eventually thin the turf and create an ideal environment for weeds to invade. If you want a healthy lawn, you definitely will need to water it from time to time.

Misconception #2: How Much I Water My Lawn Is Based on the Season

While a lot of people believe that the watering needs of the lawn are set by the season, the truth is, it has nothing to do with the season and everything to do with how much moisture is present in the soil. You might be wondering, “When do I start watering my lawn in the spring?” The answer is that it all depends on how much rainfall is present. You could have a dry spring that requires you to ramp up your watering. The hotter and windier it is, the more quickly your lawn’s soil will dry out. If you’re wondering about watering your lawn in the winter, there is no need. Grass goes dormant in the winter and the cool temperatures help keep soil from drying out. No matter what the season, the answer is giving your lawn what it needs to thrive.

Misconception #3: The Best Time to Water My Lawn is After the Sun Sets

While a lot of people say it’s best to water at night,

the reverse actually is true. The ideal time to water your lawn is just after the sun rises. At this time of day, it’s still cool and the water won’t evaporate quickly — but it still gives the grass blades plenty of time to dry before the sun sets. Wet, dark conditions create an ideal breeding ground for causing lawn disease that can damage your turf, so watering the lawn in the evening should be avoided. If you can’t find the time to water your lawn in the early morning, even with automated timers, then try to do it early enough during the day to allow grass blades to dry by nightfall. Mid-day watering won’t hurt your lawn, but you may need to do it longer as you’ll lose moisture to evaporation.

Misconception #4: Watering My Lawn by Hand is the Best Method

Watering your lawn by hand can be deceiving. It seems like you’re getting ample water everywhere, but you actually may be causing it to pool in certain areas or even run off. Oftentimes a lawn that is watered solely by hand is not receiving as much as you think. The best method to water your lawn is to use sprinklers that mimic slow, soaking rain. Hand watering works fine for very small patches of grass where you’ve planted new grass seed, or for container plants, but when it comes to your lawn as a whole, stick to sprinklers for the best results.

Misconception #5: The Worst Thing I Can Do is Under-Water my Lawn

Many have concerns about under-watering, but the truth is that overwatering can be just as bad — maybe even worse. When soil becomes oversaturated, it can become waterlogged, and you actually can drown your grass roots. An overwatered lawn is also more prone to lawn diseases.

Lawns need approximately 1 to 2 inches of water each week in order to stay healthy and green. The best way for lawns to receive that water is through a slow and soaking rain, either naturally or as a result of your sprinklers. Just be careful not to assume that a downpour has given you ample water. Stick a finger down into the first few inches of soil and get a sense of how moist it is.

Also consider putting a rain gauge outdoors to measure rainfall. When you do need to water, place a shallow can — empty tuna cans work well — halfway between your sprinkler head and its furthest point of spray. This will help you tell how much water your lawn is receiving during your supplemental watering sessions. You don’t need to be watering your lawn every day, but instead just need to ensure that it’s getting its weekly 1 to 2 inches of water with about 2-3 waterings per week.

We Watch, We Call!

Mayor Ken Klein and the Board of Trustees have heard the requests of many to report crimes in our Village. Working with our Police Department, a compiled snapshot of a month's reporting will be shown here in the Adviser. Our intent is to inform the public in order to protect and be vigilant in calling upon our Police. The Mayor urges all to stay tuned in to your neighbors' well-being and property. Call our police, report suspicious activity, be aware. (911 or Dispatch non-Emergency 708-385-5131).

Each month we continue to remind residents about all the scams that are occurring. Please remember that if anyone contacts you for any reason — overdue taxes, warrant for your arrest, allegations of illegal activity on your accounts — and offers to allow you to settle the matter by purchasing gift cards, IT IS A SCAM!

Do not give anyone on the phone your personal or banking information.

Do not allow anyone over the phone or via email or link to access your computer.

If you have any doubts at all, please contact the police department for advice. Senior Service Office Tom Dawson or any other police officer will be able to assist you in determining if it is a scam. Our officers are here 24 hours a day and would rather respond to assist you in preventing a scam then to have to take a report where you have been scammed out of thousands of dollars.

Deceptive Practice

05-02–2022: A resident reported that she received an email that appeared to come from Amazon requesting that she call the 800 number provided and reference her account being compromised. When she called the customer service number provided they attempted to obtain personal information including her credit card information and Social Security number. The resident became suspicious and hung up.

05-09-2022: A resident received a phone call from someone claiming to be an agent for Amazon who wanted to discuss a recent Apple computer/iPhone transaction. During the call, the resident was requested to obtain \$5,000.00 in Target Gift Cards in order to pay for her transaction. The resident relocated to Target to purchase the gift cards, however, learned that Target has a two gift card limit due to recent scam incidents. After purchasing two \$500.00 gift cards, the resident proceeded to Kohl's to purchase the remaining gift cards. The resident then sent pictures of the gift cards via text message to the alleged Amazon representative. The resident then received a phone call stating that she had purchased the wrong gift cards at which time she provided her banking/checking account information, after which \$500.00 was withdrawn. The resident then suspected the transaction was a scam and refused to take any further calls from that number.

05-20-2022: A resident was notified by Illinois Dept of Security that a claim was filed using his identity.

Theft

05-07 2022: A victim reported that while inside Planet Fitness located in the 4900 block of Cal Sag Road, unknown suspects broke into his locker, stealing his wallet. It was later discovered that his credit cards were used for several transactions.

Criminal Damage to Property

05-01-2022: Unknown suspects broke the windows on a vehicle in the 140th block of Laramie.

05-05-2022: Unknown suspects threw a landscaping brick through the kitchen window of a residence in the 128th block of Terrance Lane.

What Can You Do to Defeat Dangerous Summer Sun?

The nice weather is here, and with that comes more time to spend outside. It is important to remember that all family members are at risk for injuries from the sun, but everyone can take steps to protect themselves.

Covering up and avoiding the peak hours of sun are the best ways to avoid injury from the sun.

- Wear a hat with a rim facing forward with at least a 3-inch brim. Get in the shade whenever possible and wear broad-spectrum sunglasses that protect against both UVA and UVB rays.
- Remember the peak hours of sunlight are 10:00am to 4:00pm try to avoid this window for exposed outdoor activities.
- Wear sunscreen when you are outside, every day, every time. Make it a rule for outside play and a habit, just like wearing a helmet while you are riding a bike.

Those less than 6 months of age, or immobile, should be kept in the shade with the help of an umbrella, or covered with a hat and longer clothing. Sunscreen isn't harmful to babies, but shade is an easier option.

When buying sunscreen, look for a sun protection factor (SPF) of 15 or higher. Make sure that it is labeled as broad spectrum or specifically covers UVA and UVB rays. For sensitive areas, use zinc oxide cream, which is thick white or full of color that you see lifeguards wearing. This cream is also available in clear options.

Sunscreen should be reapplied at least every two hours while in the sun and immediately after being out of the water, even if labeled "waterproof."

Spray sunscreen is a favorite for parents, because kids can be hard to corral and keep in one place. You can spray on your palms, and rub gently to a child's cheeks and neck, and then spray the rest of their body and rub around. When using lotions, make sure you are getting good coverage and apply evenly. Put the zinc oxide cream on the nose and around the ears, the thicker the better.

If sunburn causes blisters, fever, chills, headaches or other feelings of illness, it is best to see a physician. These symptoms can be a sign that something else, such as heat stroke, is going on.

More serious sunburns will be treated like regular burns, which risk infection, so it's important to keep the wound clean and dry. Use antibiotic creams as directed by your doctor.

If you have any questions about sun safety, feel free to call your physician's office at any time.

Your Child and Online Safety

The Internet has changed the way we live, learn and grow. But as wonderful as it is, the pitfalls are plentiful and education on how to avoid them needs to start early. If your children are online at all, it’s never too early to provide them with guidelines to keep them safe while on the Internet:

Don’t share too much information. Create a list of things your kids should never post online — like their birthday and year, full name, address, or phone number — and make sure they understand why it is important to keep this information private.

Be careful about what you post. The Internet isn’t private. Once your kids share a post, picture, or video, they can’t control how others will use it, and it can never be permanently deleted. Teach them to be thoughtful and cautious in what they post and share online.

Connect only with people you know. “Don’t talk to strangers” is a good rule for the real world and the cyber world. Predators and stalkers can easily create fake profiles to hide their identities, so instruct your kids to only connect with friends they know in “real life.” Also, check your children’s privacy settings to make sure strangers can’t see their profiles. Sometimes privacy settings are reset to default settings during program updates, so check their profiles regularly.

Keep your location private. Many apps, networks, and devices have geo-tagging features that broadcast your location. This information could lead a stalker directly to your kids, so check that these features are completely off.

Protect your passwords. Show your kids how to create strong passwords, and make sure they know

to never share them with anyone (except their parents or a trusted adult). For guidance on how to make a strong password, see the “Best Practices for Creating a Password” tip card at www.dhs.gov/stopthinkconnect-toolkit.

Using CodeRED in Our Community

What is CodeRED and why is it important to me? CodeRED is an emergency notification service that allows emergency officials to notify residents and businesses by telephone, cell phone, text message, email and social media regarding time-sensitive general and emergency notifications. Only authorized officials have access to the CodeRED system.

When will CodeRED be used? Any message regarding the safety, property or welfare of the community will be disseminated using the CodeRED system. These may include AMBER alerts, notifications of hazardous traffic or road conditions, boil water advisories or evacuation notices.

Does the CodeRED system replace other systems that have been used to provide time-sensitive information to residents? This system is an enhancement to existing means of communication and is meant to supplement current or past systems used for mass notification.

Does the CodeRED system already have my telephone number, or do I need to sign up to receive CodeRED notifications? The CodeRED database contains information received from public databases, including regional phonebooks. However, no resident should assume that their information is in the system. If you cannot register online, you can call and speak with one of our communications specialists to complete your registration over the telephone.

I have a business located in Crestwood can I arrange to have CodeRED contact my

business? Yes. Fill out the CodeRED registration form but be sure to select the “This address is a business” option. Please note that emergency calls can only be delivered to a direct dial number. Automated attendants will disrupt the process and the calls will not be delivered. Businesses should register their main number and establish a procedure for distributing the CodeRED message to their workforce.

What if I want to register additional numbers for my address? After you submit the initial registration form, you may start the registration process again and submit more numbers for the same address.

Is my personal information protected? CodeRED is a service of Emergency Communications Network which takes security and privacy concerns very seriously. They will not sell, trade, lease or loan any data citizen supplied data to third parties.

How will I recognize a CodeRED message? A CodeRED Emergency message will have a caller ID of 866-419-5000. A CodeRED General message will have a caller ID 855-969-4636. We suggest you program both numbers in your cell phone as a “new contact” and use “CodeRED Emergency” and “CodeRED General” as the contact name. If you need to replay the emergency notification message again, simply dial the number and you will be able to hear the message again.

What should I do if I receive a CodeRED message? Listen carefully to the entire message. You will have the option to repeat the message by pressing any key. Do not call 911 for further

information unless directed to do so or if you need immediate aid from the Police or Fire department.

I have a landline, and it does not work when the power goes out. How will the system be able to contact me? Make sure you have at least one working corded telephone — and be sure to turn the ringer on. The CodeRED sign-up form allows you to indicate both a primary and alternate phone number. Cell phone and/or work phone numbers can be entered as alternate phone numbers. Both primary and alternate phone numbers will be contacted when a notification is sent.

Will the CodeRED system leave a message on an answering machine? Yes, the CodeRED system will leave a message on a machine or on voicemail. The CodeRED system will leave the entire message in one pass.

What happens if the line is busy? If the line is busy, CodeRED will try two more times to connect.

What circumstances might prevent a message from being delivered to me?

- If your contact information has changed and you have not registered your new information.
- If you only a landline at your residence, the power is out and you did not register an alternate phone number.
- If your line is busy for an extended time and your calls do not forward to voicemail or an answering machine.
- If you have a privacy manager on your main phone and you did not register an alternate phone number.
