Crestwood Partners with Midlothian to **Improve 143rd Street**

Working with its neighbor to the south, the Village of Midlothian, residents along 143rd Street are able to travel along an improved road this autumn. Both communities shared the costs equally to complete a long-needed resurfacing of pavement on this shared roadway.

"We are excited to finally see this street along our border with Midlothian get improved," said Mayor Ken Klein. "It was a priority for both our communities to get this done this year. A big 'thank you' to Mayor L'Heureux and their public works team for their partnership. It just shows what can be done when we work together as neighbors."

Crestwood and Midlothian are also working together on two other important joint projects that will benefit residents. One is the Natalie Creek Trail, currently in engineering design, which will connect Crestwood, Midlothian and Oak Forest to the Tinley Creek Trail and the Cal-Sag Trail.

The other joint project is a stormwater mitigation project, funded by the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District, to alleviate chronic flooding for the residents south of Midlothian Turnpike. Engineering on this project is set to begin in November.

We owe our greatest respect and gratitude to the men and woman who choose to protect and serve us. Thank you to all Veterans and their families. Election Day is Tuesday, November 5th, 2024. I encourage you all to get out and vote!

Thanksgiving is a time to give thanks for the blessings in life and to reflect on the best things in our Village, such as welcoming people, reconnecting with loved ones, and gathering with family and friends. I am forever grateful and thankful to the Residents, Businesses, Village Board, Village staff for the honor of serving as Mayor.

The board and I have worked hard to keep the Crestwood portion of property tax reimbursement alive, especially with the high cost of living and inflation hitting us all hard. That being said, we distributed the Refund checks at this year's Art Fair that was a BIG Success. Anyone who was unable to pick up, checks will be mailed out. Thank you to Rocco, the Director of the Recreation and Wellness Center and his staff for putting together a wonderful event for us all to enjoy!

Our 143rd Street project is 97% completed. We finished paving between Cicero and Pulaski with our neighboring town Midlothian. The street was on its last bit of life as was necessary to complete. That brings our total close to 7 million dollars in street, sidewalk and curb replacement and repair in the last 5 years. We are working hard to secure more funds from the state and federal governments to improve more streets throughout Crestwood.

One of my greatest achievements, so far since coming into office is to get more businesses open to add to our sales tax revenue. This has helped us with big improvements dealing with our streets, flooding, village buildings, two new fire trucks and the Police station remodel. I also have the final phase of the water main project in motion. We hope to have the EPA blessing in early 2025.

There has been great progress with the old ace hardware building remodel. Entire building removations that included complete demo of interior and remodeling of exterior front of building which is moving along at a fast pace. The parking lot has being repaved so people have a smooth ride into the Dunkin' drive thru. Thanks to Pure Paradise Salons this will be a great asset to our Village. I can't wait to announce when they will be opening.

BoldAge Pace located 5419 135th, is very close to completion also. They are working on minor interior and exterior projects so that they can have their occupancy

Deceptive Practice

09-09-2024: A resident reported that he was alerted by AT&T that someone had logged into his Apple account and was using his Apple credit card to purchase multiple cell phones.

09-13-2024: A victim reported that he received a notification from Chase bank that an unknown suspect was attempting to withdraw \$24,000.00 from his account. However, the transaction was blocked and no money was able to be withdrawn. Two days later, the victim discovered that his AT&T account had been hacked, his phone no longer worked, and he learned that an unknown suspect had purchased a phone using his account.



New era on the South Side as ThunderBolts franchise purchased by group led by Florence Y'alls' David

The Windy City ThunderBolts are excited to announce the sale of the franchise to an ownership group led by David DelBello which was finalized on Friday afternoon. DelBello and his partners have owned the Frontier League's Florence Y'alls since 2019.

"We want to bring an elevated baseball experience to Windy City while also focusing on building a strong community and having fun," DelBello said.

The new ownership group is taking over the ThunderBolts from Brian Kahn, who had owned the team for the last four years.

"I want to thank Brian Kahn for his commitment to our organization and wish him nothing but the best in his future endeavors," said Windy City General Manager Mike VerSchave. "The Windy City ThunderBolts couldn't be more excited to have David DelBello and his ownership team lead our club into its next chapter."

The sale of the team places the ThunderBolts underneath the same baseball umbrella as the Florence Y'alls. Both teams play in the Frontier League's West Conference

and will see each other nine times during the 2025 season.

"The Florence Y'alls are one of the most successful franchises in our league, known both for their promotional creativity and dedication to their community. We look forward to the new ideas and fresh approach that comes with new leadership," VerSchave said.

With the two teams roughly five hours apart from each other, Del-Bello is excited to partner the Y'alls and ThunderBolts staffs to make baseball even better in Crestwood and Florence.

Both teams are searching for the fourth championship in their respective franchise histories. Florence last won the league in 2000 while Windy City hopes to return the title to Crestwood for the first time since they went back-to-back in 2007 and 2008.

The ultimate hope is that both franchises can form a strong partnership that can produce many championships and lifelong memories for years to come.

BUCKS FOR BILLS'S BILLS BILL'S STORY

November 16th Fundraiser

This is the story of a healthy 58-year-old, self-employed electrician. One summer day in June Bill Garrett came home from work not feeling well. By the third day of not feeling any better, he went to an immediate care facility. He was informed that he was positive for Influenza B. It wound up being Bill's last day of work. The following day he was feeling worse, he had a terrible headache and his vision was impaired. Kelly took him to the emergency room at Palos Northwestern Hospital. This is where the nightmare begins.

The doctors confirmed that he had suffered a stroke and the bleed on his brain had affected his vision. He had an infection that was responding to antibiotics, and they found an issue with his mitral valve. They put him on a breathing machine and after being in the ICU for 11 days he was intubated. Unfortunately, his health was deteriorating. To do the surgery was very risky and to not do the surgery was a death sentence. Bill, the doctors, and his family decided to proceed with the risky surgery to repair his heart. He was going to be transferred to Northwestern Hospital downtown when there was an issue with insurance. Northwestern Hospital was considered "out of network". He would have to be transferred to Christ Hospital for the surgery. The transfer happened; he had emergency mitral valve replacement surgery. Bill had two very serious health issues occurring at once and was still in critical condition. On top of that, his kidneys started to fail and needed dialysis. After 36 days and nights in the hospital (27 in the ICU), numerous tests, procedures, tubes, machines, transfusions, doctors, and nurses — he finally came home!

Four weeks after being discharged, Bill had to return to the hospital for another five days. In August he was able to come off dialysis. He is currently in cardio rehab three days a week to try and regain the muscle loss he suffered in addition to lots of medication and doctor appointments. His doctors say they have no idea why he is "still on this earth". He is truly an amazing strong individual.

With that being said, let us all dig deep to help Bill, and his new wife Kelly, get through this difficult time of surmounting medical bills. Hope you can join us!!!



Children "playing" with or starting fires is dangerous and costly. Each year these fires cause hundreds of injuries, millions of dollars in damage, and are most likely to kill young children under the age of 5.

Some children play with fire out of curiosity, boredom, or peer pressure, not realizing its danger. But other children misuse fire because they are struggling with problems or emotions. Without proper intervention and instruction, children who misuse fire will very likely do it again. However, if punishment is the only intervention strategy used, it could actually contribute to the problem.

Follow these tips to keep your family safe:

- Keep matches and lighters out of the reach of children, up high, preferably in a locked cabinet.
- Closely supervise children, making sure that they are kept away from other fire sources, including lit candles, cigarettes, bonfires, and stoves.
- It is natural for young children to be curious and ask questions about fire, play with fire trucks, or pretend to cook.
 Use these opportunities to teach them about fire safety.
- Explain that fire moves very fast and can hurt as soon as it touches them. Tell them that this is why matches and lighters are tools for adults only.
- Teach young children to never touch matches or lighters.
 They must go tell a grown-up when matches or lighters are found.
- Establish clear rules and consequences about unsupervised and unauthorized uses of fire.
- Be a good example! Always use fire sources matches, lighters, candles, fireplaces, and campfires — in a safe manner. Never treat them as toys, or children may imitate you.
- Talk with children about what their friends or other children are doing with fire. What are they seeing online in video games, on TV, in movies, and on social media? Teach them specific ways to resist the peer pressure to misuse fire.
- Give praise for showing respect and age-appropriate responsible behavior toward fire.
