Greetings from the desk of Supervisor Patricia Joan Murphy. I can hardly believe nearly four years have passed since I took my Oath of Office as Worth Township Supervisor. At times, it has felt like no time has passed at all and other times it feels like I have been there forever. I am very proud of this administration and what we have accomplished in just a few years. One of the things I am most proud of is how we came together offering our constituents a coalition ticket, so our residents know that we are HERE TO SERVE them and not us. We work together, listen to each other, collaborate, and generate solutions to move things forward. I think this is why we have accomplished so much in our first term.

Our current administration took office with the township still feeling the aftereffects of COVID. As soon as we were sworn in, we hit the road running to bring back services that suffered or were lost due to COVID, making much needed improvements to many programs, and updating facilities and antiquated systems. We haven't looked back. There is no way to list everything this administration has accomplished these past few years, but the following are a few examples:

General Assistance

- Searched for and received a donation of walk-in cooler allowing the addition of dairy products and fresh produce for our food pantry clients
- Expanded and updated the food pantry twice
- Due to need, we are currently working on an even larger space for the food pantry

Senior Transportation (lost due to COVID)

Brought back Senior Transportation, now bigger, better, and more efficient. This program services seniors aged 55+, and adults with disabilities aged 18+ that live within the boundaries of Worth Township.

In partnership with PACE, started with one 7 passenger ADA compliant van, have grown program to three vans and a car. Please call 708-972-7075 for more details and register to ride. Happy travels!

Senior Services

We love our seniors. We have expanded Senior services by adding more trips and programs, too many to mention here. Please call 708-972-7854.

Veterans Department

Added Veterans Department where Veterans can get information and help on all veteran services. Veterans can attend one or both of our annual events including our Veterans dinner and Salute to Our Armed Forces event both events attract over 100 Veterans and gives us an opportunity to show our appreciation and honor these men and women for their service to our great nation.

Recreation Department

We built a park for all residents to enjoy. The park includes walking path, benches, a Little Tykes playground, covered picnic tables with lights, pavilions, natural plantings, Garden beds including raised beds, and a retention pond with a water feature.

Efficiency

In November, our residents voted to abolish the Worth Township Road District. Beginning in May, the Road District will be run as a department within the township. This was a bi-partisan measure that reduces recidivism, allows for shared resources, and improves oversight, efficiency and transparency.

We are always looking to improve our services and doing everything we can with the limited resources we have. Your Worth Township board is a frugal bunch. We squeeze every penny for all its worth. We are incredibly lucky to have great partnerships with our legislators who have been instrumental in securing

Yvonne Clifford, a resident of Orland Park, conveyed that since she was a small child she felt she was given the gift and artistic ability to draw. Police Department

Our Police Department has undergone some changes with the retirement of Chief Dave Weigand, who honorably served in law enforcement for over 50 years. We extend our deepest gratitude for his service. Moving forward, newly appointed Chief Sisk is prepared to meet the evolving needs of our community and ensure improved service to residents and businesses. Despite being a small-town department, our officers handle over 1,200 calls per month, requiring countless reports and man-hours.

The department continues to offer outstanding programs such as:

- National Night Out, strengthening police-community relations.
- **Park Patrols**, maintaining a strong presence to keep our public spaces safe.
- Halloween Safety Initiatives, ensuring a fun and secure experience for families.
- **House Watch Program**, providing peace of mind for residents who are out of town.
- **Nightly Business Checks**, enhancing security for our local businesses.

Fire Department

Our Fire Department has seen significant growth, transitioning from an all-volunteer unit to a part-time department and now taking further steps to ensure the safety of our village. Led by Chief Jon Newton, the department is advancing in the right direction to better serve our businesses and residents. We have implemented contract labor to staff our ambulances with full-time personnel, addressing

the increasing demand for emergency services. With over 3,500 calls per year, most of which are ambulance-related, our team is committed to providing the highest level of care.

Under Chief Newton's leadership, we have:

- Established a rigorous vehicle maintenance program to keep our equipment in top shape.
- Purchased two new fire engines and are planning to update our ambulance fleet.
- Responded heroically to a recent condo fire, not only extinguishing the flames but also organizing a community drive to support displaced residents with clothing and essentials.

Our Fire Department is more than just an emergency response unit—they are a caring and dedicated part of our village.

Public Works

Since taking office, I have been continually impressed by the dedication of our Public Works employees. These individuals work tirelessly in all types of weather conditions, responding to water main breaks, clearing fallen trees, and ensuring our roadways remain safe. After the devastating tornado of 2024, our Public Works team removed over 200 loads of debris, demonstrating their commitment to restoring and maintaining our village. Additionally, they are second to none in snow removal, ensuring safe travel during winter storms.

Village Hall

Our Village Hall staff are the backbone of daily operations, working diligently five days a week to assist residents with a variety of needs. From handling customer service and managing water issues to processing permits, finance, and village stickers, their hard work often goes unnoticed but is essential to keeping Crestwood running smoothly.

Community Services

Beyond these critical departments, our village offers numerous services that enrich the lives of our residents, including:

We Watch, We Call!

Mayor Ken Klein and the Board of Trustees have heard the requests of many to report crimes in our Village. Working with our Police Department, a compiled snapshot of a month's reporting will be shown here in the Adviser. Our intent is to inform the public in order to protect and be vigilant in calling upon our Police. The Mayor urges all to stay tuned in to your neighbors' well-being and property. Call our police, report suspicious activity, be aware. (911 or Dispatch non-Emergency 708-385-5131).

Deceptive Practice

01-04-2025: A resident reported that she received a bill from Verizon wireless and learned that unknown suspects had opened an account using her personal information without authorization.

01-19-2025: A resident reported that while she was online using her computer, she began receiving multiple pop up messages and alarms on the screen. One of the messages that popped up, displayed the Microsoft logo and said that her bank account was hacked and provided a phone number for her to call. The victim called the phone number and spoke to a subject who claimed to be with a fraud protection unit. The victim was given a second phone number to call to speak with a supervisor. The victim contacted the alleged supervisor who explained to the victim that her bank account had been hacked but they could assist her. The victim was instructed to withdraw all of her funds from her bank account and enter it into a crypto currency machine and transfer it to a supplied account number. The victim withdrew \$7800.00

from her bank and was provided a location of Palos Tobacco Beer, Wine and Liquor, located at 13430 Ridgeland in Palos Heights where she deposited the currency. The victim realized this was a scam after speaking with her daughter.

01-23-2025: A resident reported while scrolling Facebook Marketplace, he found a listing for a free Playstation gaming system. The seller posted that her son had recently passed away and she was giving away the Playstation as long as the receiver can pay for the shipping. The victim contacted the seller and was advised that the shipping would cost \$37.00. The victim made a Zelle payment to the suspect and approximately 30 minutes later the seller advised she never received the payment. The victim again used Zelle to send another \$37.00 payment. When the victim became suspicious and asked for a refund he was blocked by the profile page.

01-26-2025: A resident reported that she received notification via text from what she thought was Chase bank in reference to several fraudulent transactions on her account. The victim denied

the charges and was informed that a new debit card would need to be delivered. A new card was sent however, it was delivered to an unknown address in Chicago. The debit card was then used for several transactions at a gas station in the 2600 block of West Van Buren. An additional withdrawal was made from an unknown Chase bank location for \$3800.00.

01-27-2025: A resident reported that she received a Verizon wireless bill and later learned that unknown suspects used her personal information to open an account.

Theft

01-02-2025: A resident reported that unknown suspects stole a 1955 black Buick Sedan that was in the process of being restored from the 140th block of Lamon.

01-08-2025: A victim reported that while his unlocked vehicle was in the parking lot of the Crestwood Recreation Center, unknown suspects stole his wallet from the vehicle. The victim was notified via text that his credit card was used for

\$3000.00 worth of transactions at multiple Walgreens stores.

01-13-2025: Unknown suspects stole a black 2008 Cadillac Escalade from the 139th block of James Drive.

01-29-2025: Unknown suspects entered a vehicle in the 5200 block of James Lane and stole two stereo speakers valued at \$550.00.

Crestwood Police Department sends Supervisor to Illinois State Police Academy

Statewide manpower shortages are no secret in Law Enforcement and affect all agencies including the Illinois State Police Academy. The Crestwood Police Department sent a new candidate to the academy in September of 2024 and the State Police Academy requested that we send one of our Supervising officers along with them to assist in managing the upcoming Recruit class 04. Commander Chris Spencer was selected and he graciously relocated to Springfield for the next 18 weeks. Commander Spencer assisted the State Police Troopers with managing and instructing recruit class 04. During the 18 weeks, recruits receive their basic training to become Law Enforcement officers in the State of Illinois. Commander Spencer used his 24 years of experience in managing and teaching police officers to help the recruits learn what it takes to graduate and become safe and effective Police Officers.

After the class was completed in January, the State Police Academy Commander pre-

sented Commander Spencer with a Certificate of Recognition for his service as a Recruit Supervisor and recognized him for his assistance in the successful completion of the 640-Hour Basic Training Course #04. Please congratulate Commander Spencer for a job well done with helping secure the careers of several new Police Officers for the State of Illinois.

From The Desk of Chief Sisk

2025 is already proving to be a productive year for the Crestwood Police Department with quite a few changes and improvements in the works.

A revamp of the organizational structure has begun with the goal of increasing the efficiency of the police department, while placing a renewed emphasis technology and training. Tying in with this restructuring was the recent addition of Jack Touhy as the department's new Division Chief. Jack has over 40 years of experience in law enforcement which will be instrumental in

moving the department forward with his expertise in grant work, records and policy management. Jack is a graduate of Northwestern University School of Police Staff and Command Program, the FBI National Academy, and holds a Masters of Public Administration from Governors State University.

In addition, the Crestwood Police and Fire Commission is set to hold a promotional exam for the rank of sergeant, which will serve as the first official promotional test ever conducted for the Crestwood Police Department. Police and Fire Commission testing is designed to ensure that promotions are awarded based on merit, qualifications, and the ability to perform the duties of the higher rank.

Since beginning the transition from part time to fulltime in 2020, the Crestwood Police Department has grown to its current staffing level of 21 full-time police officers and investigators, complimented by 11 part time officers who supplement police operations.

Several opportunities for new technology and community engagement have also been put into motion to include; Live 911, a Virtual Treatment Response Team, and our New Occupant with Autism program.

Live911

When an emergency strikes, seconds count and can make a difference. This new technology offered from the Cook County 911 Dispatch Center allows officers to hear the 911 calls while they are occurring, as well as providing a GPS location of the caller.

Prior to the implementation of Live911, when a caller dialed 911 a call taker would gather the information from the caller, enter the information into a CAD system, then broadcast the information to officers as soon as the radio band was clear for use.

With Live911, the communication between 911 operator and the caller is broadcasted through the Mobile Data Terminal (MDT) in the officer's squad car. This allows for an immediate response by officers to the GPS location of the caller while continuing to hear the information being provided by the caller, meaning from your very first cry for help, we can have officers responding to your emergency. In addition, the ability of our officers to hear firsthand descriptions and other key pieces of information will provide situational awareness like never before, and allow officers to develop a response plan before arriving on scene.

Whether it be an officer responding with our newly acquired AEDs for someone having a heart attack; our Narcan equipped officers responding to a person not breathing because of an opioid overdose; a call for domestic violence or any other calls of a serious nature, our officers will be listening and responding within seconds.

Treatment Response Team (TRT)

Crestwood officers have now have access to the Cook County Sheriff's Office Co-Responder Virtual Assistance Program. This program provides officers direct access to a clinician when encountering individuals with mental health concerns. Whether it be for crisis intervention and stabilization, mental health emergencies, substance use screening, or assistance in domestic violence, these clinicians are available 24 hours a day. Our officers are able to initiate a Zoom call connecting the mental health professional with the individual in need, while on scene. The mental health professionals then maintain contact with the individual after completion of the initial call, providing additional support and ensuring they have access to any necessary resources.

Both the Live911 and the TRT have been made available to the Crestwood Police Department as part of the partnership formed with the Cook County 911 Emergency Center last year, while saving the village approximately \$300,000.00 a year for dispatch services.

Occupant with Autism

Occupant with Autism is a program to alert first responders that a residence or a vehicle may be occupied by an individual with autism. This program provides decals to residents that can be placed near the front door of the residence or the rear window of a vehicle indicating to first responders that an occupant may have autism. Residents not wanting to display a decal can also have their address flagged in the 911 database that would alert first responders to the presence of an individual with autism. Recognizing autism in individuals, especially during interactions with police officers, is critical for ensuring effective and sensitive communications. Anyone with friends or family members that could benefit from this program can find more information on the Village website, or at the Police Department during business hours.



Tornado Drill Information for Crestwood Residents

As part of pre-season tornado preparedness, the National Weather Service, working in conjunction with the Illinois Emergency Management Agency and the Illinois State Police, will schedule a State-Wide Tornado Drill for 10:00am, C.S.T., Tuesday, the 4th of March, 2025. Since Tornado planning necessarily includes a drill or exercise to familiarize everyone with the operations of their Tornado Plan and to insure its smooth operation, all those with an interest in Tornado preparedness are urged to take an active part in this drill. The State-Wide Tornado Drill provides an opportunity to test your Tornado Plan, to insure that it is up-to-date and comprehensive. The Village of Crestwood Outdoor Warning Siren System WILL BE AC-TIVATED. If this were a real tornado, what would you do to protect yourself and those of who you are responsible?

Crestwood Emergency Management Agency personnel goes out to our schools and rest homes in Crestwood to observe each

facilities' drill. Crestwood EMA has been an active partner in keeping the children and adults safe during severe weather.

During the Month of February, letters are sent out to the schools and rest homes in the village, alerting them about the statewide drill on March 4th. Our staff then begins scheduling these facilities for our members to come out and observe their drills; we do this so that it fits their schedules.

When an EMA member arrives at their building, we check in at the main office, forms are filled out for how many staff and students were in attendance that day. Then the school/facility sounds their alarm, EMA members walk up and down halls observing their procedure. I must say we do enjoy seeing the little smiling faces in the schools as we are walking the halls. We also bring color books for the kids to enjoy and help them understand the importance of being safe. At the end of the drill, EMA members meet back in the main office, any forms the school/facility

needs us to sign are done now, our forms if we see anything that could be improved is mentioned on our forms, we sign them and they make a copy for the school/facility. We ask if there are any changes in emergency plans or additions to their structures and request copies of the updated plans.

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Citizens at Risk program is Occupants with Autism



Do you have a person in your life who may be a hoarder? Hoarding is a condition where a person has persistent difficulty discarding personal possessions. The large amount of possessions fill the home and prevent the normal use of the space. Living space becomes cluttered. It may be unusable. Hoarding brings distress and emotional health concerns.

WHY HOARDING INCREASES FIRE RISKS

- Cooking is unsafe if flammable items are close to the stove or oven.
- Heating units may be too close to things that can burn. They might also be placed on unstable surfaces.
 If a heater tips over into a pile, it can cause a fire.
- Electrical wiring may be old or worn from the weight of piles. Pests could chew on wires. Damaged wires can start fires.
- Open flames from smoking materials or candles in a home with excess clutter are very dangerous.
- Blocked pathways and exits may hinder escape from a fire.

HOW HOARDING IMPACTS FIRST RESPONDERS

- Hoarding puts first responders in harm's way.

- Firefighters cannot move swiftly through a home filled with clutter.
- Responders can be trapped in a home when exits are blocked. They can be injured by objects falling from piles.
- The weight of the stored items, especially if water is added to put out a fire, can lead to building collapse.
- Fighting fires is very risky in a hoarding home. It is hard to enter the home to provide medical care.
 The clutter impedes the search and rescue of people and pets.

How Can You Help Reduce the Risk of Fire Injury

- When talking a person who hoards, focus on safety rather than the clutter. Be empathetic. Match the person's language. If they call it hoarding, then you can call it hoarding.
- ✓ Help the residents make a home safety and escape plan. Stress the importance of clear pathways and exits. Practice the plan often. Exit routes may change as new items are brought into the home.
- ✓ Install working smoke alarms in the home. Test them at least once a month.
- ✓ Reach out to community resources. Talk to members of the fire department to alert them of your concerns. They may be able to connect you with members of a hoarding task force for additional help.


